I still think of general fanzines as being national in scope and distribution, and at least partly about science fiction. GCPCG Newsletter is a costumers bulletin, Anvil is a local item, and I have no idea what Universal Translator is. Lan's Lantern fits my idea of a general fanzine and has some fine material on sf. Since I seem to be plugging things, I should point out that we're on the ballot and hope you're satified enough to vote for us.

I think Judy-Lynn del Rey deserved a Hugo. I wish her nomination wasn't posthumous. Please vote for her.

In the non-fiction category, I was surprised to see AN EDGE IN MY VOICE on the list since the only thing science-fictional about it is the author -- and he denies the label. I can't really complain, since my personal favorite, the hilarious SCIENCE MADE STUPID, only qualifies if considered a fantastic art

book. The John W. Campbell Award is usually won by a first novelist because of the exposure. Check out short story writers Karen Joy Fowler and David Zindell. Fiction? I don't feel that strongly
